2	Are you prepared to go through multiple iterations before the first submission?	
3	 Do you have the resources to complete this project? Commitment Time What are the challenges that you are anticipating? What help do you need? (practices/ people/ processes) Give yourself a deadline What is your reward system? 	
4	 Identify a suitable conference/ journal for submission: Consult with your supervisor/s Your literature review/ theoretical perspective should give you some direction Your reference list should give you some direction 	
5	 Check the credibility of the selected conference/journal: Check the databases where the conference/ journal is indexed. Web of science, and Scopus are very good indications Ask supervisor/s or collaborators when in doubt 	
6	 Understand the guideline of the selected conference/ journal: Carefully read the conference/journal scope to be sure your article is suitable Check the recent publications of the conference/ journal to understand the conference/ journal's current area of focus Download the submission template if they have one 	
7	 Find at least 3 articles from the selected conference/journal that are relevant to your intended submission: Learn the content, structure, and style of these articles (active reading) These articles should serve as an example/ guide for your writing (active reading) You can cite these articles to demonstrate your article is suitable to the conference/journal "No. 1 secret to becoming a better writer: Become a better reader" 	
8	Start to write the very first draft of your article: - Stage 1: drafting	

	- Stage 2: editing

9	Achievement 1: Send your first draft to your supervisor/s for	
	comments:	
	- Curiosity will help	
	- Respond to the comments from your supervisor/s	
	thoroughly	
	"Learning over knowing"	
10	Allow time and energy for multiple iterations:

	- Squiggly process	
	"If you get tired, learn to rest not to quit"	
11	Achievement 2: Submit the article to the selected conference/

12	Editor/ desktop check before the review stage	
13	Peer-review stage:	
	- 2-5 independent reviewers to evaluate the article	
	- They will provide written feedback	
14	Possible outcomes:	
	- The article is rejected	
	- The article is accepted and subject to minor revisions	
	- The article is accepted and subject to major revisions	
15	Achievement 3: Address reviewers' comments:	
	- Consult with your supervisor/s	
	- Respond to each comment using track changes function	
	- Prepare a letter about how you addressed the comments	
16	Achievement 4: Submit the revised article	

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
